# From the Principal

## Master Planning update

With the completion of the Carlo Acutis Building (the new two-level build for Reception and Year 1 students), which is now in full operation, as well as the development of the new nature playground and the new parent/visitor carpark on the corner of Tarcoma Avenue and Portrush Road; attention turns to the next phase of Master Planning. I provide a recap of what has transpired in recent times

Since 2022, our school, St Joseph's Payneham; our co-sited parish – Our Lady Queen of Peace; Catholic Education South Australia (CESA); and the Catholic Church Office (Adelaide Archdiocese), have had extensive dialogue to plan for the needs of both the school and parish.

From the various communication and negotiations, an initial concept plan (which an architect firm devised) was put together – I shared this with the community in April 2022. Since this period, changes have been made, for the benefit of both school and parish.

The Master Plan also includes an agreement involving a land swap between the school and parish, which has been endorsed by Catholic Education South Australia (CESA), Catholic Church Office, St Joseph's Payneham School Board, the Payneham Parish Finance Council and the Payneham Parish Pastoral Council.

In practical terms, this means:

- The school will take ownership of the former Presbytery at No. 1 Tarcoma Avenue.
- The property at 11 Marian Road (the current vacant block next to the artificial oval where initially a large portion was going to be used the Parish), will be retained by the school, as added playing space; likely to create one large oval.
- The current Parish Hall will go to the school.
- The existing asphalt space will receive a large makeover, so new courts will be established.
- The current grass oval, on the corner of Portrush Road and Marian Road, will become a shared carpark (for Parish and school), as well as a new Parish Centre.

The proposal is currently with CESA and the Archdiocese awaiting next steps. This includes determining assets and finances accordingly.

The site plan is reflective of the proposal, which can be viewed in the notice board, which sits between the Front Office and the Canteen. If you have any feedback, please contact me.

## Annual School Survey

The Annual School Survey has a focus on the different aspects of our school. ## School Uniform

If you are waiting for an ordered uniform item/s to be delivered to the school, the respective apparel can be sent home with your child.

I also provide another reminder about school winter uniform requirements:

- For the formal school uniform, either the navy formal trousers, or the navy formal shorts can be worn.
- The wool 'v' neck jumper or new formal jacket can be worn with the school uniform (no other parkas, jackets, etc. are to be worn).
- For the sports uniform, either the navy sport track pants, or the navy sport shorts can be worn.
- The school tie no longer needs to be worn with the uniform.

## Australian Early Development Census (AEDC): Building a national picture of child health

This Term, our school, along with thousands of others across the country, will participate in the Australian Early Development Census (AEDC). The AEDC is a national census that is conducted every three years by the Australian Government, in partnership with state and territory governments. It measures how children have developed by the time they start their first year of full-time school (Reception) The AEDC is voluntary, and it does not measure how well children are doing at school, nor how their school compares to other schools. Instead, it shows how children are growing and progressing. Teachers will answer questions about the five key areas of early childhood development, which are: physical health and wellbeing, emotional maturity, social competence, language and cognitive skills (school-based), and communication skills and general knowledge. In the next couple of days, a parent/caregiver letter will be circulated via Audiri.

## Car parking

Please ensure you are following the road parking regulations around the school, including not parking over yellow lines or across driveways. Additionally, only parking for staff is allowed in the Staff Carpark. The carpark on the corner of Portrush Road and Tarcoma Avenue. is for families and visitors.

## Before School supervision reminder

For children who arrive at school before 8:30am, they will need to go to Before School Care, as there is no supervision in the yard until this time.

As per the Term Two School Calendar, there is a Student Free Day scheduled for Friday 7 June. Staff will be involved in professional learning on this day. OSHC will be available – please use the usual processes for booking if your child requires care.

## Mother's Day Morning

May is a spiritually enriching month for our entire school community, during which we have celebrated numerous significant occasions. May is the month where we honour our heavenly Mother Mary, as well as all earthly mothers, and all the significant women in our lives. On Friday, 10 May we gathered for a special Mother's Day morning, welcoming South Australia's world-class long-distance runner, Jessica Stenson (nee Trengove) as our special guest. Jessica shared her story on the pursuit of dreams and motherhood. In sharing a little about my own experience as a mother, I consider becoming a mum my most treasured identity, along with my identity as a wife. While my identity as a mother might seem to overshadow my identity as a wife at times, I've learned that it actually embraces and envelops it, expanding to encompass all my identities. My identity as a mother has made me more patient, kind, hope-filled, prayerful, self-giving, and generous. My identity as a mother fills my heart with grace and gratitude and gives a renewed sense of meaning and purpose to my life.

## Mary, Help of Christians Solemnity Mass

On Friday, 24 May we celebrated the Feast of Our Lady, Help of Christians. This special day has ancient origins, dating back to the sixteenth century, which was not a peaceful time in Europe. In 1571, Catholics throughout the continent joined in praying the rosary hoping to stop the soldiers who wanted to take over Europe for a long time. These prayers were answered on 7 October 1571, which is now the feast for Our Lady of the Rosary. It was lovely to see so many parishioners attend this Solemnity Mass hosted by our school. Our students were active participants during the Mass, ministering as cross bearer, operating the Power Point, singing in the choir, and doing some of the readings, including the Prayer of the Faithful, where we prayed for peace and unity among nations.

## Pope Francis Holds First World Children's Day

Praying for peace was also at the heart of Pope Francis first World Children's Day on Saturday, 25 and 26 May in Rome. The celebration brought together 50 000 children from 100 countries. Pope Francis loves engaging in dialogue with the children. Among the children present were those from Ukraine and Palestine. When Pope Francis asked everyone if they thought 'war' was 'good', they shouted 'no!' He then asked them what they wanted, and they shouted back "Peace!" Pope Francis then invited the children to shake hands with each other and told them, "That's the way to make peace" (America - The Jesuit Review 26 May 2024). He also invited them to join him in praying for children suffering from war, children who cannot go to school, children who do not have enough to eat. Together, they recited the 'Ave Maria' with him.

## **Empowering Hope**

This month also saw people worldwide unite to celebrate Laudato Si' Week 19 - 26 May, inspiring "a personal and cultural transformation in the midst of our ecological and climate crises" (LS). This year's theme is Seeds of Hope. Inspired by Pope Francis' encyclical Laudato Si', eight Year 4 girls have established a new group - Eco Squad. They are planting seeds of hope by leading a new initiative in our school. The eight girls are listening attentively to Pope Francis' message on caring for our common home. They share a dream to make our school more sustainable through prayer, education, fun and games, and faith in action. May we all be inspired by the hope and vision of our children, and may we work together to create a brighter, more compassionate world.



#### Live Q&As with Caritas

On Thursday 23 May, our Eco Squad team participated in a live Q&A session with Caritas via Zoom. During Laudato Si' Week, Caritas Australia's Catholic Earthcare Program hosted these 30-minute sessions, offering students the chance to engage directly with staff on topics related to climate justice. This initiative provided a valuable opportunity for our students to learn more about the organisation's work and ask questions in real-time.



## Corpus Christi Invitation from our Parish Priest

On Sunday, 2 June, Fr Michael invites us to celebrate the Feast of Corpus Christi with a combined English and Italian Mass at 10:00am followed by a Eucharistic Procession outside around the church property. The Feast celebrates the presence of the body and blood of Christ in the Eucharist. It is a time for us to come together as a parish, to reflect upon and celebrate this profound mystery of faith. A Eucharistic Procession is when the Blessed Sacrament is placed in Monstrance and carried by the priest in procession under a canopy and followed by the faithful who sing and pray along the way. We then return to the church for a blessing. It is a reminder that Christ walks ahead of us as our Good Shepherd, and we want him to be present in the places we live and work. This procession is a beautiful tradition where we openly proclaim our faith and devotion to the sacrament of the Eucharist. A beautiful element of a Eucharistic Procession is the carrying of lighted candles and the strewing of flower petals by young children to make a pathway for the Blessed Sacrament. We would like all the children making their First Holy Communion and Confirmation to participate at the Mass for the Eucharistic Procession and to act as flower strewers and candle bearers assisted by their parents. ## Sacrament of Confirmation Workshop

Our next Parent-Child Sacrament of Confirmation Workshop will be on Wednesday, 19 June, from 6:30pm – 8:00pm in the School Gym. The children are reminded to bring their 'Signs of Grace: You are sent' (Confirmation) Student Guide Workbook, Parish Passport and a pen. The workbook should be completed by this date and will be collected at the end of the workshop. The children will be given the 'Signs of Grace: You are loved' (First Holy Communion) Student Guide Workbook at the end of this workshop. We look forward to continuing this meaningful preparation with you and your children as we approach this important sacramental milestone.

#### **Reconciliation Week**

Beginning in the last week of May, we celebrate Reconciliation Week. May we remember that May 27 and June 3 are important dates in Australia's history. May 27 marks the anniversary of the 1967 referendum when Australians voted to remove clauses in the Australian Constitution that discriminated against Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. June 3 marks the historic 1992 Mabo decision in which the High Court of Australia recognised native title—the recognition that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' rights over their lands did survive British colonisation; and so we acknowledge that we gather today on the land of the Kaurna people owners for the land on which you pray and pay our respects to their elders both past and present, for they hold the memories, the culture, and the wisdom upon which our nation's future will be built. By working towards reconciliation, we create a more just and equitable world for all children. Through these efforts towards reconciliation, we are reminded of the universal and enduring love that Pope Francis speaks of in his message for the first World Children's Day, where he reminds us that 'God has loved us from all eternity (cf. Jer 1:5). He looks upon us with the eyes of a loving father and a gentle mother. He never forgets us (cf. Is 49:15) and every day he accompanies us and renews us with his Spirit."

Together with the Most Blessed Virgin Mary and Saint Joseph, let us pray in these words:

Come, Holy Spirit, show us your beauty, reflected in the faces of children all over the world.

Come, Jesus, you who make all things new, who are the way that leads us to the Father, come and remain with us always.
